I really enjoyed my conversations with Caryl, she was a real neat woman with a big heart for her animals. We came and picked up the animals in April '07 & Caryl was really concerned about 1 of the heifers as it had accidentally gotten bred at the age of 1 we told her we would keep in contact & did. On August 19, 2007 the heifer we named Ellie Mae had a tiny little heifer calf that we pulled. As soon as we had her settled I called Caryl told her it was Virginia calling from Peotone and that she was a Grandma, Caryl said, "that heifer was not do for 3 more weeks." I said to her, "you've been worrying about our early bred heifer all summer haven't you?", she responded with "yes". We talked for awhile & I told her we were going to name the new heifer, "Caryl", after her & she really got a kick out of that. My son shows 4-H and showed that little heifer at the Will County Fair last August & won an 'A' ribbon as well as a Grand Champion Ribbon for the breed. We stopped last summer at the west farm to see Caryl but she was at home her nephews who were loading out of the bins said. We really enjoyed Caryl & she truly loved her cattle & I enjoyed my conversations with her over farming & animals. I never got the picture of my son showing 'Caryl' at the fair to her but I will send it in her remembrance. God Bless Caryl Clement as she has gone home now to be with her mom, dad, & brother whom she spoke with us about & missed. Caryl is happy being back with them to tend to the green pastures of Heaven & watch over her Dutch Belted cattle there. And hopefully with no rainy, snowy or bitter cold weather that as farmers we all dread.
