Greg Bush, age 43, of Bourbonnais, passed away Wednesday, July 8, 2015, at his home. He was born February 9, 1972, in Elmhurst, the son of Gordon & Geri Yeager Bush. Greg married Allison Syrcle August 9, 1997.

Greg grew up in Elmhurst where he graduated from York High School. After high school he attended Butler University in Indianapolis, IN, where he graduated cum laude with a bachelor of science degree in accounting. Greg worked for Armstrong World Industries for nine years, spending seven of those years in Kankakee as the controller/financial manager of the Kankakee flooring plant. Prior to working at Armstrong, Greg worked for 13 years at Thompson Consumers Electronics in various finance roles across the country including two years at the company's international headquarters in Paris, France. He served numerous organizations over the years including his church, United Way, committees through the school district and Cub Scouts. He was involved in Relay for Life, speaking at the Kankakee County Relay for Life survivor lunch on behalf of Armstrong for two years. He was an avid sports fan and enjoyed fantasy sports. He also enjoyed running and participation in various races in the area.

Surviving are his wife, Allison Bush of Bourbonnais; four children, Adam, Abigail, Paige, and Andrew, all at home; his father, Gordon Bush of Bourbonnais; one brother, Pete Bush & Sarah Palmer of Chicago; one sister,

Ginny Bush & Mike Campise of Villa Park; mother-in-law and father-in-law, Susan & Reggie Syrcle of Valparaiso, IN; two aunts, Peggy & Ralph O'Connell of Elmhurst and Carol McCollum of Austin, TX; and numerous cousins.

He is preceded in death by his mother and two uncles, Hap McCollum and Robert Ruth.

Cremation Rites will be accorded. A memorial visitation will be held from 10 a.m. Saturday, July 18, 2015, until the 12 Noon memorial service at Grace Community United Methodist Church in Bourbonnais. Pastor Mary Brady will officiate the service.

Private family inurnment will be held at a later date.

Memorial gifts may be made for his children's education.

“ I'm not one to look for any profound meaning in this, nor can I speak to whatever fighting spirit Greg gave in recent months and years, but I can say that I'm deeply saddened by the whole situation and that I prefer to remember Greg as the giggling, laid-back guy who had a knack for putting people at ease and making you feel good about yourself. I'll never forget his hand-to-mouth, bent-over-at-the-waist, convulsing laugh, as if whatever you said was the funniest thing he'd ever heard. Lord knows my humor is an acquired taste, but Greg always made me feel like I was the most witty man alive. He was probably the most unpretentious man I ever met; in a world of people trying too hard to be like everyone else, Greg never tried to be anything but who he was. He was an easy guy to like, and to love, and although it's incredibly unfair (to say the least) the way his life went over the past 3 1/2 years, I prefer to remember the happy-go-lucky, easy-going kid whose only care in the world seemed to be to talk and do his spastic giggle and be around friends.

One of my favorite moments being a sportswriter came a few years back, when I was covering a University of Washington basketball game in San Jose during the NCAA tournament. I was sitting courtside when I got a text from Greg asking if that was me next to the court. I thought maybe he'd seen me on TV, but pretty soon he told me to look across, the way, in Row Whatever. There he was, sitting next to his beautiful wife, watching his beloved Butler Bulldogs and afterward the three of us went out and talked and laughed and had a good old time. I must admit, I've been a closet Butler fan ever since ... if only for Greg.

I met Greg as a somewhat awkward teenager, the younger brother of my college best friend, Pete. Watching from afar as he grew into a confident, genuine man was a pure pleasure, and I won't ever forget him.

I'll continue to wave the Butler Bulldogs flag for him -- easy to do, seeing as my favorite college team (Bradley) has zero chance of ever being relevant (not that that stopped me from betting Greg on

the rare occasion that the two BUs met) -- and will get a little smile on my face, maybe even a giggle, whenever I see the Bulldogs on TV or catch Brad Stevens on the Celtics' bench.

There's not really a great way to end this, other than to pass along a letter Greg sent around to a lot of us three years ago, shortly after he went through his first brain surgery. The letter meant a lot to me then, and it does now, and I've looked at it many times for inspiration when the piddly things in my own life aren't going the way I'd have liked.
