She worked and put herself through nursing school and became an LVN. I was a teenager and remember her constantly studying for her nursing tests. For some reason she could never get past 70-75% mark to become an RN, though she knew the material. But she never gave up. She would try and try again. I never told her how much I admired her for this. She was the smartest woman I knew. She was an avid reader and had stacks of National Geographic magazines near her night stand. I learned much about the outside world looking at images of people in far off lands. My grandmother lacked in social skills to some degree and did not always tell people what was on her mind. The first time I remember hearing her say the words "I love you" to me was when I was moving out of her house and into my own apartment. We became closer as I matured into a woman. All of the strength I have comes from her. She taught me that success comes through hard work. I still remember when she stopped smoking ciggarettes, cold turkey. Once she quite that was it. I was very proud of her. I wish I would have thought to let her know that. I guess she knows now. Grandma I love you. I miss you terribly. But I am at peace knowing that you are in god's hands now.
