Richard Hassett, age 74, of Bradley, passed away Monday, February 19, 2018 at Vibra Hospital of Northwestern Indiana in Crown Point.

He proudly served in the United States Marine Corps during the Vietnam War and was awarded the Purple Heart.

“A while back I was going through my Marine Corps scrap book and recalled how Dick and I got into the Marine Corps. I smiled and relived the day we departed Kankakee in route to Chicago Airport to get on a plane to San Diego, California, Marine Corps Recruit Depot. This quote seemed to depict various sojourns along our way through life together.

“It's interesting how we often can't see the ways in which we are being strong - like, you can't be aware of what you're doing that's tough and brave at the time that you're doing it because if you knew that it was brave, then you'd be scared.” (Lena Dunham)

Dick and I grew up together through our school years. We both participated in sports together early in Junior High School. However, we were both somewhat leery of our capabilities but convinced ourselves we would be good because we played “Park Lot football” with the older guys without equipment and lived through it. To help us make a final decision we were convinced that girls liked football players – pure gallantry. We made the school team two years. When we started High School I wanted to concentrate on participating in ‘Track and Field’. Dick said he would try out too instead of football. That said, we concentrated on our own events, which was the first time we were not doing the same thing. However, our own after school hours and training the weekends were our fun time. I dare not dwell on that.

During the senior year we started talking of what we would do after graduation. Together, we came up with the idea of joining the U.S. Marine Corps. After reading and hearing about their reputation, that was definitely for us. So here we go again – off into that not aware of what we were getting into mode. Immediately after graduation we went down to the local Marine Recruiter to join the Marine Corps on the so called “Buddy System”. As it turned out it was only the ‘Buddy System’ through Boot Camp. After Boot Camp we were split up and assigned different units for more training in Camp Pendleton. We didn't know when we would see each other again, if ever.

Two years later, just by luck, we ran into each other in Okinawa. As

it turned out my unit was coming back from Vietnam back to our home base on Okinawa and his unit was just arriving from the U.S. to relieve us in Vietnam. We had a few minutes on the dock where both ships were docked to exchange a brief buddy handshake so we wouldn't violate the military "hurry up and wait" schedule - LOL.

The next time I got to see Dick would be five years later at a Class Reunion. Needless to say this was our reunion and reunions every five years thereafter. Dick and Carol would occasionally go out of their way from their route from or to their winter home in Arizona to visit us down in Texas. We were like brothers our entire lives and I love him like a brother. I will miss him.

We will meet again Dick. We always went together and God always guided us through those various sojourns throughout our lives and brought us back safely. Simper fi my dear friend.
