



Thomas E. Holtz

February 19, 1949 - January 31, 2012

Visitation for Thomas E. Holtz, 62, of Bradley, will be from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. Monday at the Clancy-Gernon Funeral Home, Bourbonnais. A procession will leave the funeral home at 10 a.m. Tuesday to proceed to Abraham Lincoln National Cemetery in Elwood, for the 11 a.m. burial services, with military honors. Memorials may be made to Pause for Patriotism Inc. He passed away Tuesday (Jan. 31, 2012) at his home.

He was born Feb. 19, 1949, in Kankakee, the son of Fritz and Julia Gulczynski Holtz. He resided in Bradley most of his life. He graduated from Bradley-Bourbonnais Community High School and joined the U.S. Marines. He was sent to Vietnam in 1968, where he was severely wounded. He survived, but lost his left leg below the knee. He retired/disabled from the U.S. Marine Corps that year. Tom went on to attend numerous barber and hair styling schools both locally and in Europe. He then began his career as a stylist, and after more than 20 years in the business and having three local shops, he retired.

Tom never considered himself disabled. If anything, it made him more determined to be active both in his personal life and his community. With that said, he went on to be one of the founders of the much-noted, communitywide Pause for Patriotism (1993 to present) program held each year on Veterans Day. He did so out of a sense of patriotism, as a salute to the military and our

nation's freedom. This was especially true for our wounded and fallen military heroes. He was associated with a number of other community and veteran organizations.

Tom was an avid boater and belonged to his much-loved Kankakee Valley Boat Club. He always said, "If I miss anything, I will really miss boating and being with those guys and gals down at the boat club." He enjoyed water-skiing and snow-skiing.

One thing for sure, anyone who met Tom will have varied and numerous memories: Compassionate, determined, wild and crazy, helpful, opinionated, humorous, or just your good friend Tom.

In the end, Tom's sense of duty to his country and love for his family and friends will surely be missed by all.

He is survived by his son and daughter-in-law, Erik and Kasey Holtz, of Wheatridge, Colo.; grandchildren, Maddison and Davis; former wife, Vickie Wright, of Sandia, Texas; close friend, Jan Bartels; one brother, Richard L. "Butch" Holtz, and sister-in-law, Karen, of Virginia Beach, Va.; his niece, Erica Holtz Thompson, her son, Logan, and husband, Mark Thompson, of Reston, Va. He is also survived by many aunts, uncles, cousins and close friends in and out of the Kankakee area.

He was preceded in death by his parents.

Tom used to cut my sister's hair when she was a student at Culver. Before she'd come home for a school break, my mother would have already made her appt to get a haircut w/ Tom because the wait was so long. I went with her the last time she was home for one of those breaks---about 30 years ago. By then he'd moved his business from the Arcade Building to a house on the north side of Station St. across from Blue's Cafe. The other hairstylists---a guy and about 4 women---worked downstairs, but Tom had his own chair on the second floor. You had to climb up a narrow creaky steep wooden staircase to arrive where he performed magical wonders with his scissors. It was fun because he would have music playing and was always glad to see customers. And he had this mysterious aura about him. People (or "kids" like us) would lower their voices respectfully and half whisper, "Hey there goes Tom Holtz. He was injured in Viet Nam and survived. Someone told me he has a fake leg!" Now I know he was only six years my senior, but he seemed so much older then. Looking back I realize he really was "much older" than the rest of us. It came from the other worldliness he got for surviving a gut wrenching war a world away from which few men in his batallion returned. RIP Tom. You brought joy to so many people.
